ArtWorks Poetry Reading 2022

The ArtWorks poetry reading, featuring Mary Oishi, was held at the New Mexico History Museum on February 28, 2023. Eight classes from six different Santa Fe Public Schools attended the reading, totalling over 180 students. The students ranged from 4th through 8th grades. The schools attending included: Acequia Madre Elementary, Carlos Gilbert Elementary, El Dorado Community School, Gonzales Community School, Nava Elementary and Nina Otero Community School.

Poet and ArtWorks Teaching Artist Alejandro Jimenez led workshops with students in their classrooms both before and after Mary's reading. This helped familiarize students with Mary's work and poetry as a genre. After attending Mary's reading, students reflected on the experience the following week in their classroom with Alejandro and created their own poems. A selection of these poems written by SFPS students is included here.



Mary Oishi

Mary Oishi, Albuquerque Poet Laureate from 2020 to 2022, is the author of *Spirit Birds They Told Me*, co-author of *Rock Paper Scissors*, and finalist for the New Mexico Arizona Book Award. She had her first poem published when she was 13 and since then she has been widely published in journals and anthologies, in print and digitally. She is the editor of a new poetry anthology: One Albuquerque, One Hundred Poems, published in December of 2022.

Oishi worked professionally as an on-air personality in public radio for over 25 years, hosting music shows at four radio stations in New Mexico and Colorado. Her involvement in the work of community and social justice is life-long. She served as lead facilitator for an LGBTQ youth group for seventeen years, was a delegate to the UN World Conference Against Racism in 2001, and produced Peace Buzz in 2003. Next year her new poetry collection, *Sidewalk Cruiseship*, will be published by UNM Press.

An ArtWorks Unit of Study

Using a teaching methodology developed at the Lincoln Center Institute in New York City, ArtWorks' faculty of accomplished Teaching Artists – professional musicians, visual artist, poets, actors, and dancers – connect students to art through a three-part *Unit of Study*:

1) An **in-class workshop** in which the teaching artist prepares students for the art they will experience on their upcoming field trip, and gives students the tools to describe, analyze, and interpret the art

2) A **field trip** to see a performance by a world-class arts organization at the Lensic Performing Arts Center or a poetry reading by an acclaimed poet at the New Mexico History Museum, or a visit to a renowned museum such as the New Mexico Museum of Art, Georgia O'Keeffe Museum, IAIA Museum of Contemporary Native Arts, Museum of Indian Arts and Culture, the Museum of International Folk Art, or the Wheelwright Museum of the American Indian.

3) A **follow-up classroom workshop** in which the teaching artist helps students reflect on the art they experienced. Students then create their own art that is meaningful to them based on what they saw, heard, or felt on the field trip.

Training SFPS Teachers

ArtWorks offers Santa Fe Public School (SFPS) teachers the opportunity to attend a two-day intensive summer training as well as various professional development workshops throughout the school year. As part of these trainings, SFPS teachers experience an ArtWorks Unit of Study as a student and gain tools to successfully integrate the arts into their classrooms.

The SFPS teachers trained in the ArtWorks experiential teaching methodology not only use it when partnering with ArtWorks' Teaching Artists, but may also employ it in their daily lesson planning. The ArtWorks methodology is adapted from Lincoln Center Institute in New York City, and uses inquiry, reflection and art-making to spark students' imaginations and curiosity.

ArtWorks' Student Art Exhibitions

In addition to the work in this anthology, ArtWorks collaborates with our museum and gallery partners to host exhibitions of student artwork.

During the 2022-23 school year, ArtWorks partnered with three different organizations to host student exhibitions: the City of Santa Fe Arts and Culture Department's Community Gallery, the Museum of International Folk Art and the New Mexico Museum of Art. All exhibits are open to the public and are a celebration of the unique visions of Santa Fe's youth.

ArtWorks at Nava Elementary

In 2011 Nava Elementary School invited ArtWorks to launch its first school-wide implementation. Fortunately, funders understood the value of a school-wide program and provided the necessary support for program evaluation that would provide statistical information on whether or not ArtWorks helped students succeed in school. ArtWorks contracted with the University of New Mexico to design and conduct just such an in-depth evaluation. The UNM results indicate what teachers have been reporting for years—ArtWorks makes school more interesting and helps students succeed academically. The ArtWorks methodology allows students to discover personal connections to their schoolwork, and it is these personal connections that draw students into the lessons and inspire creativity, curiosity, and a life-long interest in learning.

ArtWorks: The Beginnings

ArtWorks was started in 2001 by the City of Santa Fe Arts Commission and has since grown to serve over 75 Santa Fe Public School teachers and 1,600 students every year. In 2010, ArtWorks became a program of the Partners in Education Foundation for the Santa Fe Public Schools, a nonprofit organization founded in 1988 on the conviction that the entire community shares the responsibility for and the benefits of high-quality public education. As a program of Partners in Education, ArtWorks provides SFPS students and teachers with **meaningful arts experiences** in the local community through an inquiry-driven program of art-making, introspective reflection and guided visits to professional live art performances and museums.

ArtWorks' Teaching Artists

ArtWorks' greatest asset is its faculty of Teaching Artists (TAs). ArtWorks Teaching Artists include actors, dancers, poets, musicians and visual artists. All have been trained in ArtWorks' experiential teaching methodology and all have extensive experience working with young people.

As working artists, the Teaching Artists bring fresh energy and enthusiasm to classrooms. Students are excited to work with real artists, and teachers enjoy the role reversal as they participate in TA-led workshops as if they were students. Observing the class from this perspective gives teachers new insights into how to reach and inspire their students, especially those they may have struggled to connect with earlier in the year.

Kristine Banh (Musician) is a graduate of the University of New Mexico where she earned a degree in music, Africana Studies and a certificate in race and social justice. Among her music endeavors, Kristine is passionate about incorporating social justice with any project she can. She is working on writing several pieces that connect her love for music and commitment to social justice.



Melissa Briggs (Dancer) is a graduate of New York University/Tisch School of the Arts and Smith College. For over 20 years, she has taught young people ages three to university age in schools and arts programs in New York City, Brooklyn, Santa Fe, Los Alamos, and Albuquerque. Melissa is currently on faculty at both NDI New Mexico and UNM.



Wendy Chapin (Visual & Theater Artist) is the Artistic Director of Adobe Rose Theatre and has taught acting to ages 7 – 70 for over 30 years. She directed such plays as *Good People* by David Lindsay Abaire and *Gideon's Knot* by Johnna Adams. Wendy is the recipient of a National Endowment for the Arts Directing Fellowship.

Patricia Gay-Webb (Visual Artist) is originally from Buenos Aires, Argentina. She has a degree in biology and worked in environmental policy until she found her true passion in the field of education, receiving a Masters in Integrating Curriculum Through the Arts from Lesley University. For 14 years she worked as a dual language educator for Santa Fe Public Schools where she had the opportunity to work with ArtWorks as a classroom teacher and saw first-hand the enthusiasm that the program brought to her students.





Joaquin Gallegos (Musician) was born in Santa Fe, New Mexico, and comes from a family of artists and musicians. Joaquin has made Andalucia his second home having spent several years living, studying and performing there and in the United States as well as in Latin America. His first album, *La Jornada*, was released in 2005 and his second album, *Nuevos Comienzos* was

released in 2015. Joaquin has recorded on many artists' albums and toured with Flamenco Vivo Carlota Santana, EntreFlamenco and as a solo artist. Joaquin has also done arts and education work for Flamenco Vivo, which entailed residencies and lecture demonstrations for kids from kindergarten to college. Alejandro Jimenez (Poet) is a formerlyundocumented immigrant, poet, writer, and educator from Colima, Mexico, living in New Mexico. He is the 2021 Mexican National Poetry Slam Champion, he is a two-time National Poetry Slam Semi-Finalist (US), multiple time TEDx Speaker/Performer, and regional Emmynominated poet. In May 2022, he was featured in TIME Magazine as " one of 80 Mexican artists shaping contemporary Mexican culture." His work centers and touches on cultural identity, immigrant narratives, masculinity, memory, and the intersections of them all.





Lucy Ranney (Lead Teaching Artist & Visual

Artist) is a fiber and visual artist and a native of Santa Fe, who currently works in the public schools as a visiting artist and has been teaching in the community for a number of years.
